It includes unlimited Off-Peak train travel from London Paddington with Great Western Railway along the route to Bristol Temple Meads via Reading and Swindon, or Newbury and Pewsey, with options to branch off towards ravel on listed bus services along the routes. The rail route is marked on the map with a green line. Choose from an East, West or global pass one day or seven days ticket to enjoy your Great West Way adventure.

Get to grips with the Great West Way – literally. There are plenty of places to grab adventure here – by the handlebars, the paddle or the steering wheel - and you'll find a new way to get the heart racing around every corner. Plot a course to these exciting activities and you'll go home with plenty of stories to tell.



63. Learn the ropes on a rock-climbing lesson at the high limestone cliffs of Avon Gorge. There are 750 climbing routes here, some of them so physically and mentally challenging that they've only been climbed once. (A5)

64. Returning in 2022 is Go Aloft! at Brunel's SS Great Britain. Climb the rigging of the Victorian ship, and reach heights of more than 25 metres above Bristol harbour! If you're feeling really brave you can even walk out along the main yard. (A4)

65. Test your muscle power on a narrow boating journey up one of the longest continuous flights of locks in England. You'll rise 72 metres (237ft) in just 2.5 miles at Caen Hill lock flight en route to the market town of Devizes. (D4)

66. Take the wheel of a Formula Ford 1600 or Lotus Elise on a lap of Castle Combe race track. (C3) 67. Take a dip al fresco at Thames Lido in Kings Meadow (H3), Reading. This beautiful Edwardian swimming baths has been fully restored and offers non-members swimming sessions every weekday from

69. Within easy reach of the Great West Way, Gloucestershire is home to Cotswold Water Park, the largest man-made inland waterway in Europe, try your hand at waterskiing on one of the lakes. (D2) **70.** To really test your mettle, take on the three

mountain bike tracks that run through ancient Swinley Forest from Swinley Bike Hub in Bracknell. The 1km (1093yd) Green route is best for beginners and families, with its gentle descents and easy climbs, but most cyclists can tackle the Blue (9km, 5.6miles), with its single track strewn with roots and rocks and plenty of dips and descents through the pine

28. Saddle up for a trek along the Ridgeway, riding hrough the North Wessex Downs to reach the rive Thames in the Chilterns AONB. **(F4)**

29. Work the signals in the interactive GWR signal box and drive a train simulator at STEAM, the Museum of the Great Western Railway, in Swindon. (E3)

> 32. Marvel at the world's oldest working steam engines, the Crofton Beam Engines. Fed by a handstoked coal-fired boiler, they're still plugging away at the job they were designed to do more than 200 years ago – pumping water up to the highest point of the Kennet & Avon canal. (E4)

33. Walk on the ancient pavements as the Romans did 2,000 years ago at the Roman Baths. (B4)

34. Pose for the perfect postcard-worthy shot on the arched stone bridge in the heart of Castle Combe. This protected village is like a time capsule, with not a modern building in sight. No surprise then that it has

36. Stoop to enter West Kennet Long Barrow, a Neolithic tomb built around 5,650 years ago. You can walk along inside for about 13 metres before reaching the final chamber. Bring a torch! (E4)

37. Set out on foot through the Cotswolds on the 102-mile Cotswold Way, one of England's national trails. You'll start at Bath Abbey (B4) and head north along the Cotswold escarpment, strolling through

idyllic villages and passing ancient churches, abbeys and mansions set in some of the country's most celebrated and best protected - countryside. 38. Cycle along an old railway track, following the 3-mile Bristol & Bath Railway Path between the two cities. This was once the route of the Midland Railway and some evidence of its life as a railway is still visible The route is tarmac, traffic-free and almost entirely level – making it a breeze for all levels of ability. (B4)

Discover Houses and Gardens

Enter some of England's most illustrious country estates and discover what life was like for their owners during different periods in history, from medieval times to the present day.

71. Smell the rhododendrons at Bowood's Woodland gardens, open every spring during flowering season. Two miles of paths wind their way between the vibrantly coloured plants, many of which have beer putting on this display every year since 1854. **(D4)**

72. Stand in Harry Potter's footsteps in the very room he first saw his parents, reflected in the Mirror of Erised (the Chapter House in Lacock Abbey). (C4)

73. Dyrham Park -There can't be many more enjoyable places to stretch your legs than the grounds of this marvellous mansion house. Situated near Chippenham, colonial civil servant. Dutch visitors will notice lots of niliar touches in the rooms, which are much as he lived in them with his wife and 3 children. From his Delftware collection to paintings by renowned Dutch artists such as Cornelis de Heem. You'll get a real taste of what life was like for people of his standing especially if you try the spicy hot chocolate made there to a 17th-century recipe. (B3)

74. Most visit Avebury to behold its astonishing stone circles. But Avebury Manor has a few mysteries of its own - some say the Grade I Listed building is haunted. Perhaps a more pleasing feature of the manor house, however, is that guests are positively encouraged to touch, sit in and lie on any of the furniture - even play a game of snooker. The house was refurbished as part of a TV series called 'The Manor Reborn', so much of the interior is composed of replica furniture. Nine of its rooms were faithfully decorated in styles of different eras, inspired by real-life residents from Tudor times to the 20th century. (E4)

75. Stroll through a "living work of art" at Stourhead, one of England's greatest landscape gardens. The best bath house and a ha ha to keep the deer out without time to visit is the autumn, when the trees turn golden, spoiling the view. **(C4)**

76. At Iford Manor's remarkable gardens we have Harold A Peto to thank, a visionary architect who sought to fuse the style of the Italian gardens he'd admired on his travels with a series of attractive buildings. Cypress trees, sweet smelling lilies and draping branches of wisteria all have their place. Set on a steep hillside, the garden offers inspiring views of the

nany of the mansion's interesting stories can be traced an evening champagne tour of the garden with the back to former resident William Blathwayt, an eminent owner, or stay in the gorgeous cottage on site for a real immersion in the hidden, timeless beauty of the Iford 77. Prior Park. At this elegant 18th-century garden in

In early spring, silky white snowdrops and bright yellow daffodils begin to bloom. Come summer, you'll find swans with their fluffy grey cygnets floating around together in the lakes, and tiny wild raspberries emerging in the woods. Stop for a cup of tea and a slice of something nice and just take it all in. (B4)

78. Within easy reach of the Great West Way discover the birthplace of Sir Winston Churchill with a visit to Blenheim Palace. (G1)

79. Discover the gardens of legendary landscape gardener Capability Brown at Elizabethan mansion house Corsham Court. There's a glorious one-mile Great Walk planted with cedars and planes, a Gothic
